Out of those 5 graduates, 50% are registered at CNM and 1 was unable to be reached to answer the survey. What strategies seem to work? Wrap around supports to help stabilize barriers and then work toward building a bridge with Dual Credit enrollment where possible. What is not as effective? PR Campaigns.

CCCS utilizes a school-wide staff Mentoring program where every staff has 7-10 students/families assigned to them. The mentor builds relationship through weekly phone calls to students and biweekly to monthly calls to parents. Also Quarterly parent report card meetings and mid-qr progress meetings. This program is consistently reported by students and parents to be very helpful and has become a backbone of services and relationship building.

National rates of student to counselor ratios recommend 250 students to 1 Social Worker. CCCS currently has approximately 90-100 students to 1 Social Worker. This is an important service to provide needs for students. We also do a survey of needs each year.
